



Eye on the Environment: VCF Ownership Meeting tackles global climate change

The VCF Annual Technical Forum and Ownership Meeting was held last October 4, 2008 at the Golden Valley Hotel in Cebu City. The gathering was attended by 68 leaders and representatives of 43 VCF primary cooperative member-investors from Regions 6, 7 and 8 and partner organizations. For this year 2008, the Technical Forum centered on environmental management.

In her welcome message, VCF's Chairperson Ms. Evelyn Clarin exhorted the participants to pay close attention to the presentations of the resource facilitators especially on how the cooperative sector can participate in promoting environmental management. She pointed two challenges to the VCF members: preserving Mother Earth and sustaining the economy. Ms. Clarin urged those in attendance to become more strong and progressive to speak out on environmental concerns.

This year's Technical Forum had the Foundation for A Sustainable Society (FSSI) represented by Mr. Augusto (Toto) Camba and Ms. Anne Marie Torres as technical resource facilitators.

Many environmental issues affecting our Mother Earth were raised and revealed during the Forum. Presentations from FSSI and movie clips from the movie "An Inconvenient Truth" of the former U.S. Vice President Al Gore were

used as an eye opener to the participants especially on what was really happening to the global climate.

While the presentations on environmental management was technical at some point, it increased awareness on the realities of the situation. The discussion on environmental management accounting (EMA) likewise provided significant considerations on how businesses, in this case cooperatives, can actually track carbon footprints and take action.

Greening the cooperative sector thus defines what role that every individual member, officer and staff can do to protect, heal and save the resources of our Mother Earth. For her part, VCF Vice-Chair Zenaida Novabos said "Coops empower people to help themselves. We have this capacity to move people towards a certain end, a wonderful demonstration of how we can all work together to



benefit the environment."

The VCF Chair Ms. Evelyn Clarin and VCF Manager Ms. Betta Socorro S. Salera presented a Plaque of Appreciation to FSSI in recognition for their contribution to the Annual Technical Forum. Tokens of appreciation were likewise given to the facilitators.

The VCF Ownership Meeting immediately followed after the Forum. The VCF Manager gave updates and highlights in terms of new membership affiliations, share capitals, loans granted and new investments to VCF.

Newly-hired VCF staff Mildred Lising (VCF-Manila) and Haygie Lopez (VCF-Cebu) were also introduced.

VCF holds annual Technical Forum on selected topics to enhance members' capacities, and this year is undeniably full of learning and was indeed successful.

See you guys for next year's VCF Technical Forum and Ownership Meeting and let's see what VCF will have in hand to augment our knowledge.

Lessons that should be remembered not just by mind but mostly by heart from the previous Technical Forum to save the planet and to establish that "GREEN IS INDEED REALLY IN" are the 6'S:

Sort, Systematize, Sweep, Standardize, Self-discipline and Sustain!

We all have shared responsibilities. Saving the planet requires concerted effort by all stakeholders -- local government, national government, private sector, NGO's, communities, development partners -- to manage a changing and more invasive environment.

VCF wants to start it from us...from YOU...

We scoured the internet for tips on wise use of resources while helping the environment... below are the results!

Energy Conservation

- 1) Turn off the lights when nobody is in the room! This goes especially for bathrooms and common rooms when they aren't occupied!
- 2) Avoid the "phantom load". Appliances such as your TV, DVD player, cell phone charger, etc. consume energy just by being plugged in. Unplug them when not in use!
- 3) Turn down your thermostat before going to bed. For every degree you reduce it, you will save 5% on heating.
- 4) Wash your clothes in cold water. It works just as well as warm water, will keep colors from bleeding, and saves the energy that would have gone to heating the water!



Tips to conserve water...

Water is an essential ingredient in most manufacturing operations.



Especially for those 1 billion in the high-consumption class, cutting down on purchases of material things—from clothes and shoes to paper and appliances—conserves and protects water supplies as effectively as installing a low-flush toilet does. As with so many natural resources, as long as prices in the marketplace fail to reflect full social and ecological costs, voluntary changes in consumption patterns will play an important role in the quest for sustainability.

In the bathroom:

- 1) Put a plastic bottle or a plastic bag weighted with pebbles and filled with water in your toilet tank. Displacing water in this manner allows you to use less water with each flush. Saves 5 to 10 gallons a day. That's up to 300 gallons a month, even more for large families. Better yet, for even greater savings, replace your water-guzzling five to seven gallon a flush toilet with a one and a half gallon, ultra-low flush model.
- 2) If you're taking a shower, don't waste cold water while waiting for hot water to reach the shower head. Catch that water in

a container to use on your outside plants or to flush your toilet. Saves 200 to 300 gallons a month.



3) Take shorter showers!

This will save between 5 and 10 gallons of water per minute.

4) Install water-saving shower heads or flow restrictors. Saves 500 to 800 gallons per month.

5) Check toilet for leaks. Put dye tablets or food coloring into the tank. If color appears in the bowl without flushing, there's a leak that should be repaired. Saves 400 gallons a month.

Water conservation in the kitchen:

1) If you wash dishes by hand--and that's the best way--don't leave the water running for rinsing. If you have two sinks, fill one with rinse water. If you only have one sink, use a spray device or short blasts instead of letting the water run. Saves 200 to 500 gallons a month.

2) When washing dishes by hand, use the least amount of detergent possible. This minimizes rinse water needed. Saves 50 to 150 gallons a month.

3) When washing dishes, use a full sink of warm water instead of running the faucet continuously.

4) Keep a bottle of drinking water in the refrigerator. This beats the wasteful habit of running tap water to cool it for drinking. Saves 200 to 300 gallons a month.

5) Don't defrost frozen foods with running water. Either plan ahead by placing frozen items in the refrigerator overnight or defrost them in the microwave. Saves 50 to 150 gallons a month.

Water conservation outside your home:

1) Only wash your clothes if you have a full load to do. Pool laundry with your friends to make full loads! Saves 300 to 800 gallons per month.

2) Water your lawn only when it needs it. Better yet, especially during summer, water with a hose. And best of all, convert your lawn to native plants.

3) Put a layer of mulch around trees and plants. Chunks of bark, coco peat or gravel slows down evaporation. Saves 750 to 1,500 gallons a month.

4) Don't run the hose while washing your car. Use a bucket of water and a quick hose rinse at the end. Saves 150 gallons each time. For a two-car family that's up to 1,200 gallons a month.

5) Use a broom instead of a hose to clean driveways and sidewalks. Saves 150 gallons or more each time. At once a week, that's more than 600 gallons a month.
